OSCM Division Professional Development Workshops 2018

The 2018 OSCM Division PDW program was a great success. The program consisted of four research and teaching focused developmental workshops. These addressed key problems facing our field and novel research methods that are likely to be used more frequently in coming years. In addition to the four PDWs, OSCM supported a number of PDWs as a secondary sponsor to several other divisions.

One of the fundamental problems in management research is how to draw valid conclusions when the sample size is very small, sometimes one-single case study. In the workshop titled, "What can we learn from a single case or small n-size research? State of the Science", organized by Suzanne de Treville and colleagues. They presented ways in how researchers could use small samples to draw generalizable conclusions. Continuing with the theme of conducting rigorous research that is publishable, Barb Flynn and colleagues discussed best practices related to "crafting a journal submission that makes a theoretical contribution".

In another PDW, Stephanie Eckerd and colleagues built on last year's successful PDW on behavioral research. This time the group leveraged what has been learned about individual and team behavior dynamics and extended their discussion to the "inter-organizational" setting. After a panel discussion and Q&A with the audience, the participants engaged in a round-table discussion. Inter-organizational behavior is a very new, and an exciting area of research, and we hope that PDW participants would benefit greatly.

The final workshop focused on "predictive analytics". It was organized by Ujjal Mukherjee and a group of other young scholars. Predictive Analytics is one of the newest research methods, and is of immense interest to supply chain and operations research community. It is likely to gain more popularity in the coming years, especially given the rapidity with which large databases are becoming available to researchers.

As another full-day PDW, Stephanie Eckerd and Kai Förstl organized the junior faculty and doctoral student consortium. It included an impressive list of scholars who served as mentors and panelists to facilitate development of scholars who are early in their careers (details on page 4 and 5 of this newsletter).

I sincerely thank everyone who was involved in organizing and participating in the 2018 PDW program. Please continue your support in 2019.

2018 Scholarly Program Overview

The 2018 OSCM Scholarly Program included 56 traditional divisional papers. We had 14 paper sessions, 5 symposia and 1 plenary session. Each paper session was focused on a topic related to the management of operations and supply chains, such as operations strategy, project management, sustainability, buyer-supplier relationships, behavioral operations management and service operations. For the traditional scholarly sessions that were held on Monday and Tuesday, the acceptance rate was about 40%.

I would like to thank the volunteers who reviewed the 141 submissions. We were able to obtain at least two reviews for all of the papers that were submitted to the conference; many papers received three reviewer reports. We recognized four reviewers with Best Reviewer awards. On page 9 we honor the four winners of this award.

On Sunday, we had a Sunday Café about Women in Operations & Supply Chain, facilitated by Wendy Tate. On Monday, we sponsored two best paper sessions. In particular, the OSCM Division sponsors the Chan Hahn Best Paper Award and the Best Student Paper Award. The finalists for both awards were selected based on input from an external committee. See page 6 and 7 of this Newsletter for profiles of all our award recipients.

We had several opportunities to hear from and meet the editors of top OSCM journals. On Saturday evening, Journal of Supply Chain Management (JSCM) hosted a reception which included presentation of the JSCM Best Paper Award. The session was hosted by the Co-Editors Barb Flynn, Brian Fugate, and Mark Pagell. On Sunday, the Journal of Operations Management hosted a Best Paper session. The JOM session was hosted by Co-Editors Suzanne de Treville and Tyson Browning. The JOM Editors presented best paper and reviewer awards as well. In addition, the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) sponsored an award for Best Paper in Supply Management,

OSCM Best Student Paper Award 2018

Stefan Kurpjuweit — Partnering with New Venture Suppliers: A Dynamic Capabilities Approach

Congratulations on winning this award, Stefan. Can you explain us a bit more about your background and current position & research focus?

"I am a research associate and Ph.D. candidate at the Chair of Logistics Management at ETH Zurich. I obtained both my Bachelor's and my Master's degree in Industrial Engineering and Management from the Karlsruhe Institute of Technology (KIT) in Germany and spent an academic year at the University of Barcelona (UB). My research focuses on two areas: First, I want to understand how companies can attract and integrate innovations from innovative supply chain partners – in particular from startup suppliers. Second, I am focusing on how organizations can benefit from adopting innovative technologies and subsequently, how this adoption affects companies' supply chains. Thereby, I am particularly interested in studying the integration of different technologies such as additive manufacturing and blockchain."



Why did you join the OSCM division and what would you like to get out of the AOM at large and our OSCM Division?

"I think there is a lot of tacit knowledge in our profession that is difficult to access. The AOM provides young scholars with the opportunity to tap into this knowledge by facilitating informal conversations but also by offering workshops and sessions where, for instance, the editors of our best journals provide advice and guidance. Another plus for young scholars like me is the chance to get feedback on relatively mature papers. In particular, the reviews we receive help to get a feeling whether the paper goes in the right direction. And, of course, it is interesting to see the faces behind the (big) names. From a broader perspective, I think the AOM offers the great opportunity to learn from other divisions. For instance, for doing research in the startup supplier area, we work on the interface with several other divisions such as Strategic Management, TIM, or Entrepreneurship."

What is the most interesting outcome of your awarded AOM paper?

This paper shows that firms need to adapt their organizational structures and their traditional supplier management practices to successfully integrate startups into their supply base. This ability to partner effectively with startup suppliers is a dynamic capability that needs to be developed over time through organizational learning. However, many companies do not learn from their relationships with startup suppliers as these collaborations often remain in a pilot stage. In other words, firms tend to overemphasize sensing (e.g. pilot projects) over seizing capabilities (e.g. starting real BSRs), which is hindering the development of this dynamic partnering capability."

Winners of the Chan Hahn Best Paper Award

Siqi Ma, John Aloysius, and Li Hao—Gender Pairing and Cooperative Behavior: An Experimental Study

Congratulations all on winning this award. Can you introduce yourself?

Ma: I am currently an Assistant Professor at University of Akron. I got my doctoral degree from University of Arkansas. My research interests fall into two streams: Behavioral OM and omni-channel retailing. My research tries to understand economic decision making and its psychological underpinnings, generating insights to inform theory as well as practice.

Aloysius: I am a professor in the Walton College of Business at the University of Arkansas. My doctoral degree is from Temple University and my current research interests in primarily behavioral OSCM are in two streams. I study interorganizational relationships and also how technology is transforming the workplace and people's lives.

Hao: I obtained my PhD in economics from George Mason University with specialization in behavioral economics, experimental methodologies, and econometrics. I now hold a tenure-track position in economics at the University of Ar-

kansas, where I met John Aloysius and Siqi Ma. I conduct lab and field experiments to understand when and why individuals deviate from maximizing profit, My ultimate goal is to promote market efficiency and prosocial behavior.

What is the most interesting outcome of your awarded AOM paper?

Ma: This research is based on the second essay of my dissertation and we explore the influence of gender pairing on cooperation and performance in buyer-supplier relationships. Such collaboration is one determinant factor of supply chain efficiency. Beyond complete contracts and monetary incentives, we find that the particular characteristics of females can promote cooperation.

Aloysius: The supply chain context is unique as firms try to further their own interests, while cooperating with each other benefits them all collectively. Our study showed that women tended to cooperate more even when they had incentive to either misreport information or to be risk averse in their production decisions.

Hao: The degree of their collaborative action depends on who they think they are, and who they believe their partner is. Sex role theory helps explain the treatment differences we observe: women are more collaborative than men,

and it was startling to see that everyone one expects women to be more collaborative than men.

Aloysius: As my two female co-authors like to remind me, all-women dyads outperformed mixed gender dyads, who in turn outperformed all-male dyads!

And what are your future academic plans?

Ma: My focus is to continue working on research projects in Behavioral OM and omnichannel retailing area and publishing in high quality journals. I hope the implications of my research can help operations managers make better decisions.

Hao: I will continue shedding light on understanding human decision making in cases where formal contracts are incomplete or even impossible. This is particularly pertinent in the field of Behavioral OM, where I hope to continue my journey with a broader impact. I am also using my econometrics training to explore applications in analytics.

Aloysius: My focus is on helping doctoral students discover their passions as they begin their academic careers. Several students including a couple that work with me are working on operations and supply chain projects that have regulatory and policy implications. I am excited to watch them develop and see where these take them!

Professor Guide joined the faculty at the Smeal College of Business in the fall of 2002. He was a visiting research fellow at INSEAD (2001-2003). His research has appeared in numerous academic and managerial journals, including *Management Science*, *Manufacturing & Service Operations Management*, Production *and Operations Management* and *Harvard Business Review*. Professor Guide has been a guest editor for feature issues of *California Management Review* (46(2)), *Interfaces* (33(6)) and *Production and Operations Management* (15(3&4)) devoted to closed-loop supply chains. He has been co-Editor-in-Chief of the *Journal of Operations Management*. His research has been supported by grants from the Carnegie Bosch Institute and the National Science Foundation. He also regularly works with global organizations (including the US Navy, Hewlett-Packard, Robert Bosch Tools, Cisco and Pitney Bowes, Inc.) on a variety of closed-loop supply chain problems. His current research is focused on the development and control of closed-loop supply chains, time-based models for commercial product returns, remanufacturing, sustainable operations and producer responsibility legislation. Professor Carter is a Professor in the Department of Supply Chain Management at ASU. His primary research stream focuses on sustainable supply chain management. This research stream encompasses ethical issues in buyer-supplier relationships, environmental supply management, diversity sourcing, perceptions of opportunism in supply chain relationships, and the broader, integrative concepts of social responsibility and sustainability. A second, more recent area of research examines behavioral, decision making phenomena within supply management contexts. In addition to his scholarly work, Professor Carter has five years of experience in the areas of transportation and logistics with Ryder Systems, Hechinger Company, and the U.S. Department of Transportation. Additionally, he engaged in field-based research with over 100 Fortune 1000-size firms in the U.S. and Germany includes work with CAPS Research and McKinsey & Company. Call for Proposals: 2019 Professional Development Workshops (PDW)

The Operations and Supply Chain Management (OSCM) Division invites you to submit creative and innovative proposals for Professional Development Workshops (PDWs) for the 2019 Academy of Management Annual Meeting in Boston, Massachusetts. PDWs will take place on Friday, August 9 and Saturday, August 10, 2019.

The OSCM Division encourages PDWs that build knowledge and share expertise oriented towards emerging research themes and methods as well as management practice in the OSCM area. PDW sessions are also intended for professional development of the participants, so sessions around research and teaching development are called for. PDWs can take different formats, such as workshops, tutorials, debates, roundtable discussions, panel discussions, facility tours, etc.

Call for Papers: 2019 Scholarly Program

Specific domain: The OSCM division invites scholarly papers and symposia submissions addressing any aspect of the operations and supply chain management. Topics include changing work design configurations, efficient and effective operations and supply chains, flow of material and information within and between organizations while minimizing required resources, non-value-added work, and variability as well as relevance of these topics in environment that is rapidly evolving to include artificial intelligence, robotics and internet of things.

Special Instructions: In addition to submissions addressing the supply chain and operations domain, the OSCM division also encourages papers and symposia focused on the 2019 conference theme, <u>Understanding the Inclusive Organization</u>. Inclusive organizations are open systems of opportunity in which all stakeholders have access to information, resources, and the capacity to fully contribute to their functioning. The 2019 theme invites members to understand the inclusive organization by answering such questions as: What is inclusive practice? How does inclusion effect employee, organizational, or societal outcomes? How can we create more inclusive environments? Submissions addressing the theme in these or other ways related to operations and supply chain management are welcome.

Symposia proposals are particularly encouraged, as they provide conference attendees a coherent, focused session of either a series of authored papers explicitly linked to a common theme, or a group of panellists engaged in a formal interactive discussion around particular issues or questions.

The OSCM division also encourages submissions from PhD students. Papers with a PhD student as the first or sole author should be clearly identified at the time of submission. We also encourage papers that are earlier in development that would benefit from collegial discussion.

Division Awards: The OSCM division honors the following papers:

Chan Hahn Best Paper Award: All submitted and accepted papers are automatically entered into the competition. The Finalists are selected before the conference, and the award is announced and handed at the conference.

Best Student Paper Award: One of the papers authored and submitted by doctoral students will also be awarded for the Best Student Paper Award. To be To be considered for this award a paper must be identified as a "student authored" paper at the time of submission.

Submission Process: All submissions must be made through the <u>AOM submission system</u> website. The submission system will open on Tuesday **November 27, 2018**. The submission deadline is **January 15, 2019 at 5:00 PM ET (NY Time)** (but earlier submissions are encouraged).

Please carefully review all the <u>submission guidelines and formatting instructions</u> before submitting. If any of the guidelines or formatting instructions are not met, the submission cannot be reviewed. Please, note that there is lim-

ited space on the scholarly program; therefore, not all submissions will be accepted. All submissions will nevertheless make an important contribution to the OSCM division, as the number of submissions impacts future allocation of time on the program. If your paper is accepted, you are committing to attend the scholarly program in Boston, August 11 (Sunday) through August 13 (Tuesday), 2019.






Discover the New Connect@AOM Platform for the OSCM Community
