Heterodoxies is different from conventional sections in that it exclusively publishes dissenting works.

Aims and Scope

Contributions published in *Heterodoxies* revisit or theoretically discuss a problem or thought, with the aim of outlining accounts that depart from and challenge the axioms of established paradigms in the literatures related to business ethics, corporate responsibility and sustainability. Contributions may challenge a particular view, elegantly breaking with the agreed use or standard practice that prevails in a given community of thought. *Heterodoxies* is a reflection space in which necessary debates are started or restarted.

Submissions

Submissions are made online via ScholarOne and should follow BEER's style guide. Manuscripts should typically be between 3,000 and 6,000 words in length (not including references, tables and figures). Extensive footnotes/endnotes and appendices should be avoided.

Heterodoxies welcomes, but is not limited to, the following types of contributions:

- **Viewpoints:** this kind of article is based on the author's expert opinion anchored in extant theory and/or practice. Thus, the analysis takes readers through the points of contention that the author wishes to problematize. Empirical evidence may, or may not, be brought to bear on the issue at stake, although *Heterodoxies* agrees with Popper that observations "are interpretations in the light of theories".
- **Philosophical arguments:** more speculative in nature than a Viewpoint, this kind of article challenges current philosophical thinking, carefully elaborating points and counterpoints that outline the author's contention vis-à-vis a specific contender understood either as a thinker, thesis, or philosophical tradition.
- **Interview-based contributions:** this kind of article aims to disentangle the intricacies of contemporary scholarly or practitioners' work based on interview(s) with the respective authors. Interviewees should be known for having made a significant contribution to theory or practice.

Review Process

Submissions are subject to a double-blind review process, managed by the *Heterodoxies* Associate Editors.

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
